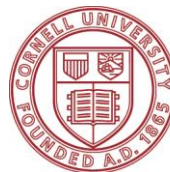

GENERAL RULES

No entry fee charged.

Classes in this department are open to all enrolled 4-H members unless otherwise noted. 4-H members must be enrolled by June 1, 2011. **Information about Passes** will be available one week prior to the fair.

NOTE: Gate 3 (by the 4-H Building) - walk-in entrance, handicap parking, and vendor parking gate, open 6 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.
Gate 1 will be a vehicle only gate - parking will be on the infield.
Livestock Gate (located behind cattle barn) - Open 6 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.
Gate 4 - walk-in only gate.
Gate 5 (by the horses) - vehicle only gate - open 24 hours.

All club members must submit to the 4-H Educator evidence that they are 4-H members, enrolled with Chemung County 4-H program prior to June 1 of the current year. They should certify on their entry blank to the fact that the articles exhibited were grown or produced by them as part of their 4-H Club work during the 12 months proceeding the days of the fair.

All exhibitors will present a list of all articles or products that they plan to exhibit and all the demonstrations and contests they plan to enter on a **PROPERLY FILLED OUT 4-H ENTRY CARD** by the entry deadline. Entry cards must be signed by parent or leader. Entry cards and tags are available at the 4-H office in Elmira prior to the fair.

ALL 4-H ENTRIES MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED AND POSTMARKED OR SUBMITTED TO THE 4-H OFFICE ON OR BEFORE JULY 10, 2011 (or next business day). ABSOLUTELY NO ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER THE DEADLINE!

NO EXHIBITS WILL BE ACCEPTED UNLESS THEY ARE PROPERLY LABELED AND ENTERED. ENTRIES NOT COMPLETED AND NOT ENTERED ON THE CORRECT FORM WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE FOR PRIZE MONEY. DOUBLE ENTRY CARDS MAY BE OBTAINED FROM THE 4-H OFFICE. EXHIBITS MUST BE REMOVED BEGINNING AT 5:00 P.M. SUNDAY, THE LAST DAY OF FAIR, BUT CANNOT BE REMOVED PRIOR TO THE RELEASE TIME OR PRIZE MONEY IS FORFEITED.

Premiums:

Due to economic uncertainty of this year, we are unsure if there will be premiums this year. If there are premiums, the following policy will be followed.

Prize money will be awarded at 4-H Recognition Event in the fall. Premium checks **MUST BE CASHED WITHIN 90 DAYS** of receiving, or they will be void. It will be assumed that any exhibitor that does not cash their check wishes to donate their premium money to the Chemung County 4-H Program. The county **WILL NOT** issue a second check for lost checks. Premiums to be paid as listed with respect to available funds.

State Fair 4-H Projects (non-animal) - Projects to be displayed in the county booth at State Fair are chosen by the last day of the Chemung County Fair. You will know if your project has been chosen by the presence of a state fair sticker on your entry card. If you discover one of these on your project, do not take it home. Please bring it to the 4-H Building so that we may include it in our county display.

Projects taken to the State Fair are not automatically entered for judging. You will however receive a participation ribbon. 4-H'ers who wishes to have their projects judged are responsible for following the instructions in the State Youth Fair Book regarding entry procedures. These books are located in the 4-H Building, on the desk. You must also notify the 4-H Educator with your intentions. We will then make sure a judge evaluates your project.

Because space is limited when we pack the projects for State Fair, the 4-H staff reserves the rights to make changes as needed regarding which projects we actually take. You will still receive a participation ribbon even if your project isn't taken at the last minute. Every attempt will be made to take projects entered for judging.



If you have any questions please see the 4-H Educator during the fair.

State Fair 4-H Projects (animal) – If you are interested in taking animals to State Fair, please see 4-H Educator. All State Fair entries are due to the County Educator by August 7, 2011. Animal entries to State Fair are required to have office educator approval.

State Fair Teen Leaders – Any teen interested in attending State Fair with Chemung County during the “last rotation” please see 4-H Educator by **August 7th**.

GENERAL INFORMATION

DOUBLE ENTRY CARDS - All items exhibited at the fair must have a double entry card securely attached to the project. These cards may be picked up at the 4-H office prior to the fair.

THE DANISH JUDGING SYSTEM – All 4-H judging is done on the Danish System. While it was originally developed for livestock, it has since been applied to all other 4-H judging.

Under this system, each exhibit, be it a dress, flower, steer or presentation, is compared to the ideal for that category. Exhibits receive an Excellent (Blue), Good (Red), or Worthy (White) award, as compared to the ideal. In a class of fifteen exhibits, there may be any combination of blues, reds, and whites including the possibility of all blue awards being given. Judges are asked to compare all exhibits to the ideal rather than to other exhibits.

Animal Science Clinics – there is a requirement that all animal science exhibitors must attend at least 2 educational clinics. These clinics must be related to animal science but are not required to be in the specie that the youth is showing in. Clinics are required by June 6th, if you have not completed 2 by June 6th. You must contact the office staff before July 10th to work out details for clinic completion.

SECTION A - CLUB EXHIBITS

Chemung County 4-H “It’s America”. Let us take you Places.

Each club is welcome and encouraged to display a club exhibit. Clubs will display all general 4-H projects. Please be creative in arranging your club’s display of projects. We strongly encourage club displays that are “hands-on” for fairgoers. Club Exhibits may contain projects that were not entered to be judged individually.

Your booth will be judged on the following:

- Use of 4-H Theme – **“4-H “It’s America”. Let us take you Places”**
- Identification (club name, location & leader’s name)
- Appearance (simple, balanced, proper color combination)
- Workmanship (neat, well constructed)
- Attracting attention
- Interest holding
- Judged on club display **not** projects.

Class No.

1. **Promotional & Educational Booth -**

Clubs are encouraged to incorporate the theme in their 4-H Club Exhibit; Express ideas simply and clearly; Be accurate; Make signs and names of club readable; Attract attention; Show ideas in unusual way (slogan, theme, color); and Be original.



2. **Educational Exhibit** - Project related. Should tell about any project/activity of project related to subject matter. Premium:
3. **New Club Banner** - To be at least 2' square.
4. **Group Action Booth** - Club or group develops a working demonstration to be presented one or more days. Evaluation at end of day by 4-H Educator. Two hour shifts, twice per day.
5. **Public Presentation** - Individual Demonstration, Illustrated talk, Speech or Recitation. Completed on the designated Presentation Day at the Fair. Must be pre-entered on the General Entry form (please identify as presentation)
6. **Individual Educational Exhibit** - Need to educate about 4-H or about a project. Exhibit should be approximately 3'x2'
7. **Teen Helpers and Clubs** - Leadership - **Must be 13 years of age and over or work with your club.** Members assist with judging, watching displays, presenting information to the public, kids & horses tent, ice cream/snack booth, working in 4-H Building office along with other assigned responsibilities. Mandatory training session (see schedule in front of Fairbook).
8. **Club Community Service** - Exhibits may include a 3-D display, poster board, or series of photos to describe a community service project conducted by a 4-H club. The creative use of photos, posters, samples, or recordings to tell the story is encouraged. Emphasis will be on the process the group went through to complete the community service project.
9. **Agricultural Promotion Exhibit** – Please base exhibit around Chemung County 4-H theme - The purpose of the youth agricultural display is: Promote agriculture; make consumers more aware of agriculture, and how it applies in our everyday life. Displays are judged on the following:
 - 1) Appropriateness to agriculture
 - 2) Originality
 - 3) Appearance
 - 4) Accuracy
 - 5) Age of applicant will be a consideration

Exhibits will be set up and displayed in the 4-H Display Hall. Exhibits must be in place by 6:00 p.m., Monday, August 1. An agricultural related team will judge entries. Places will be announced on Saturday, August 6TH at the Livestock Auction.

This class is sponsored and donated by Tom Giles. The class is open to individuals or youth groups (4-H clubs, FFA, etc.).

10. **Individual School Project Exhibit** - Limit of one (1) 3'x2' exhibit, report, or final product of a school project done this past school year.

RECORD BOOKS AND POSTERS

11. **Record Books** - All exhibits must have been made during the current club year. Only information pertaining to this club year will be considered. Please mark where the 2010-2011 year begins in books that include more than one year. Exhibits include: club history scrapbooks, 4-H member achievement books, project record books, news reporter, secretary, and treasurer books.



12. **Posters** - Created as part of a public presentation.
13. **Posters** - Posters created as a project should be entered in this class but will be judged according to subject area. Ex. Posters with photos showing the results of a Natural Resource project will be judged in the Natural Resources area. A poster of a food pyramid designed to explain good nutrition will be judged in the food area, consumer education, etc.
14. **Individual Community Service Exhibit** - Exhibits may include a 3-D display, poster board, or series of photos to describe a community service project conducted by a 4-H member. The creative use of photos, posters, samples, or recordings to tell the story is encouraged. Emphasis will be on the process the individual went through to complete the community service project.

ANIMAL SCIENCE

The purpose of the Dairy and Livestock Show is to teach the fundamentals of good dairy and livestock husbandry, to emphasize production and quality in farm animals, to stress the breeding of better livestock, to demonstrate the finer points of fitting showmanship, and to provide recognition for each year's efforts.

GENERAL ELIGIBILITY AND REGULATIONS

All Cloverbuds exhibiting any animal must have a signed 4-H Cloverbud Acknowledgement of Risk Form. Forms will be handed out at mandatory animal science meeting. Without this form, Cloverbuds will not be able to participate in animal projects at the fair.

Exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H by **June 1 of current year**. Exhibitors must show the animals they enter. **Exhibitors and immediate families are limited to 25 total animals in Dairy and Livestock areas.**

- a. If an exhibitor has two entries in a class, the second entry must be shown by another 4-H'er. 4-H'ers are limited to TWO entries per exhibitor per class in Dairy, Livestock, and Rabbit. Market Animals must follow sale rules.
- b. In emergency situations, exception can be made, but arrangements must be cleared with the 4-H Educator. Exceptions will not be made for school or work.
- c. Exhibitors should present a neat appearance at showing. 4-H members may NOT stay on the grounds overnight unless under the supervision of an adult who is also staying overnight. Signed parental permission slip will be required. F.F.A. exhibitors must be in good standing.

NEW FOR 2011 GENERAL CARE RULES

The 4-H Animal Science participants have a unique and major responsibility for the public image of animal husbandry throughout the county, and even state in which they live. In order to convey a positive public image with your 4-H projects we ask that **all** exhibitors follow these guidelines:

- A. Animals should arrive at fairgrounds relatively clean when unloaded from truck or trailer they should be relatively free of caked on or matted manure, dirt, and or mud.
- B. Animals bathing at the fair **should not** be the first of the year or even the first in the animal's life-span. All animals should previously been introduced to hose, brush, water, etc = much less stress on animal.



- C. While at the fair **all** animals should be in clean dry bedding and fresh feed and or water at all times. Cleaning of stables and stalls should be completed by the start of any planned show in the livestock/dairy/market animal areas, as these are times when the public will be arriving and witnessing the care of the animals.
- D. At no time should any animal be struck or visibly abused with hand/foot or other instrument that is deemed cruel. No inappropriate language will be tolerated.

Failure to adhere by the above guidelines will result in a strong warning the first time.* A second offense could result in suspension of participating in exhibiting animal entries in the 4-H venue for 1 year.

*A severe offense could result in automatic removal from 4-H events/participation.

Any and all decisions regarding these guidelines will be made in cooperation with the Grievance committee and 4-H staff.

OWNERSHIP AND REGISTRATION OF ANIMALS

All livestock must have been cared for by the exhibitor since June 1.

Exhibitor Owned Animals: Animals shown in the purebred classes must be registered in the exhibitor's name and entered by name and number. Exhibitors should bring their papers with them to the section superintendent when the animals are entered. All grade animals must have a project animal certificate.

Members showing OWNED animals must supply:

- 1) Registration paper or project animal certificate
- 2) Health paper

Non-Exhibitor Owned Animals: Philosophy of Non-Ownership is NOT AVAILABLE to youth already owning an animal of the species. Youth are limited to ONE NON-OWNED ANIMAL PER SPECIES in Horses, Dairy, and Livestock classes. These non-owned animals must meet all regulations (i.e., dates, registration, health, etc.) pertinent to that species.

Members showing NON-OWNED animals must supply:

- 1) Registration paper or project animal certificate
- 2) Health paper
- 3) Non-Ownership Certificate

Hay and Bedding: The Fair Association will NOT furnish hay or bedding for 4-H animals.

Release Time: Sunday August 7, 2011 beginning at 5:00 pm. All animals must remain in place on Fairgrounds for length of time indicated in Fair Schedule. Violation will result in being banned from showing in future fairs.

Open Class: 4-H exhibitors wishing to participate in individual Open Classes must comply with the open class entry closing date. Open Class Premium Books are available at the Fair Secretary's Office. NO LATE ENTRIES ACCEPTED.

NEW YORK STATE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND MARKETS LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

All health requirements must meet open class standards. Please see attached New York State Health Requirements.

Animal Health Requirements For
Admission to New York State and County Fairs
(Part 351 of NYS Agriculture and Markets Regulations)

General Prohibitions and Requirements

- No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.
- No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian or an authorized agent.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to or require removal from the fair premises, or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of or exposed to any infectious, contagious or communicable disease.
- Note: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.
- All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)

- Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, deer, monkeys, misc. ruminants, camels and elephants require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- The CVI must be issued by an accredited veterinarian.
- All animals must be uniquely identified. All manmade ID must be recorded. Refer to Animal Identification section below for more information.
- Only one species is allowed per certificate.
- The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.

New York Origin Livestock:

- A valid intrastate CVI (AI 61) is required.
- Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI.
- The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.



Out of State Origin Livestock:

All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate

CVI

The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of issuance. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a fair must be within 30 days of issuance. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a state official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

Animal Identification

Animals requiring a CVI must be uniquely identified. Acceptable forms of unique identification include official eartag, legible registration tattoo or electronic identification (microchip). A sketch or photograph signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian is acceptable identification for llamas and alpacas.

Note: A complete written description is sufficient identification for horses entering New York accompanied by a CVI. The description must match the EIA test record. Horse sketches and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars and other markings as necessary to uniquely identify the horse. "Bay, no markings" is not an acceptable description for a CVI or EIA test record.

- It is acceptable for a fair or organization (4H for example) to utilize a unique tag for identification of market class cattle and swine. This tag must include an individual number for each animal and must be approved prior to the fair.
- If electronic ID is utilized as the sole form of identification, the exhibitor is responsible for supplying a working electronic reader. If electronic ID cannot be read entry will be denied.
- Acceptable identification allows positive matching of the animal to all accompanying documents including papers with laboratory test results and vaccination statements.
- Llama and alpaca drawings must positively identify the individual animal.
- A name or a statement of color without additional distinguishing features or manmade identification is not acceptable identification.
- USDA approved scrapie identification is required for all sheep and goats.

Rabies Vaccination

- Current rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) and that are 105 days or older on the date of admission to the fair.
- An animal is currently vaccinated beginning 14 days following primary (initial) vaccination continuing for the period stated in the manufacturer's instructions.
- Rabies vaccine label instructions allow vaccination as early as 84 days of age. This allows a one week window between 84 and 91 days of age (105 minus 14 days) where vaccine can be administered to meet the 105 day requirement.
- If an animal reaches the minimum age for rabies vaccination during the fair season, the vaccination requirement must be met even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.



Note: Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be currently vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors.

- The New York State Fair requires rabies vaccination for all livestock species entering the grounds.

Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination

- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the attending veterinarian or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the attending veterinarian.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration and the duration of immunity if longer than one year.
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on an EIA test record, it must be signed separately in addition to the required EIA test record signature.
- NOTE: Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.

D-PI Testing

- All cattle and new world camelids (llamas, alpacas, guanacos and vicunas) exhibited at NY county fairs or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal and recording the test date on the CVI.
- If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

Cattle Testing:

- Currently acceptable BVD tests for cattle less than 61 days old:
 - o Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)
 - o whole blood virus isolation
 - o whole blood PCR
 - Currently acceptable BVD tests for cattle 61 days of age and older:
 - o Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)
 - o Serum or milk Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE)
 - o Whole blood virus isolation
 - Whole blood, serum or plasma PCR

Note: The NYS Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at Cornell University can conduct PCR testing on pools of up to 10 cattle.

Llama, Alpaca, Guanaco, Vicuna Testing

- Currently Acceptable BVD tests:
 - o PCR
 - o Whole blood virus isolation

Note: The NYS Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at Cornell University can pool llama, etc. samples for PCR testing as follows: Animals less than 61 days of age can be tested in pools of 2 animals, whole blood only. Animals 61 days of age and older can be tested in pools of 5 animals using whole blood, serum or plasma.



Cleaning and Disinfection

All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and Market regulations).

Kidding and Lambing

Due to the concern about the spread of scrapie, any sheep or goats that are exhibited at a county fair that have recently given birth or have a vaginal discharge, will be ordered removed along with their offspring. The causative agent for scrapie may be present in high concentration in fluids associated with birth and the risk of transmission is considered highest at that time.

Commingling of Sheep and Cattle

Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep to cattle, it is recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep.

Commingling of Swine and Poultry

Due to the potential spread of influenza viruses it is recommended that swine and poultry be housed in separate locations.

Isolation on Returning Home

The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin.

Individual Species Requirements

Horses

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is not required for New York origin horses. CVI is required for imported horses.
- Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test is required for all horses 6 months of age or older. The horse must be accompanied by a valid negative EIA test record. The test must have been conducted during the current or previous calendar years for New York origin horses. For imported horses, the test must be conducted within 12 months of entry.
- The EIA test certificate must include a complete description of the horse.
- Current rabies vaccination is required for all horses 105 days of age or older (see above).

Cattle

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified (see Animal Identification section above).
- Current rabies vaccination is required for all cattle 105 days of age or older (see above).
- All cattle must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). (See current acceptable tests above.) The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- All cattle must be currently vaccinated against bovine respiratory disease complex including bovine respiratory syncytial virus, bovine virus diarrhea, infectious bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza with a product administered in a manner and time frame adequate to confer protective immunity for these diseases for the duration of the fair.



Sheep

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a USDA approved flock tattoo and individual animal ID number or 3) electronic ID if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program (owner must supply a working electronic reader).

For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518-218-7540.

- Current rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 105 days of age or older (see above).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing accredited veterinarian that the flock of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Goats

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible registration tattoo or 3) a USDA approved herd tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic ID if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic ID is recorded on the goats registration paper (owner must supply a working electronic reader).

For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518-218-7540.

- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing accredited veterinarian that the herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Swine

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified (see Animal Identification section above).

LLamas, Alpacas, Guanacos and Vicunas (New world camelids)

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified (see Animal Identification section above).
- All llamas, etc. must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). (See current acceptable tests above.) The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

Poultry

- Poultry (with the exception of doves, pigeons and waterfowl) must be accompanied by 1) results of a negative pullorum typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition OR 2) proof that the birds originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid clean flock or equivalent flock.



INTERSTATE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR FAIR ANIMALS

This document is a supplement to the Animal Health Requirement Booklet published for animals exhibited at New York State County Fairs and the State Fair. Its purpose is to summarize the import requirements that must be met for livestock entering New York destined for fairs. Note that individual county fairs may require rabies vaccination in species not required by the state. Contact the specific fair for their requirements. Further assistance can be obtained by contacting the Division of Animal Industry (DAI) at 518-457-3502 or your State Veterinarian's office.

CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI)

See pg. 3 of the Animal Health Requirement Booklet. A CVI is required for all animals moving interstate. Note that interstate CVI'S must be issued by an accredited veterinarian and countersigned by the State Veterinarian in the state of origin. The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of issuance. During the fair season, from July 1 through Labor Day, Interstate CVI's can be used multiple times as long as the initial entrance to a fair in NY is within 30 days of issuance and the CVI is signed or stamped by a fair official. All documentation must accompany the animals.

Animals not meeting the interstate and/or fair requirements will not be allowed to be displayed on the grounds. Individual ID is required on all animals. Animals with incomplete or illegible ID will be rejected. Where rabies vaccination is required, the information can be included on the health certificate.

HORSES

Horses 6 months of age or older must test negative for equine infectious anemia. The test must be conducted within 12 months of the day of entry. The horse must be clearly and completely identified. Rabies vaccination is required for all horses over 105 days of age

SECTION B - ANIMAL SCIENCE

Class No.

1. **Herdsmanship - Mandatory** class for all 4-H animal exhibitors: Dairy, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat and Horse. Parents are not to do the work for the 4-H youth!

A revolving ribbon will be displayed during fair week.

Manure removal from aisles and bedding and the final appearance of their area at the time of release.

Animals clean and blankets acceptable and clean if used. Orderly storage of feed, hay, and straw and avoidance of unnecessary waste.

Tools, buckets, feed boxes, and other items need to be in place. Name cards, need to be legible and properly hung.

Halters suitable and cattle tied at desirable length.

Conduct, cooperation, and appearance of exhibitors.

Repeated disregard of reasonable good Herdsmanship and cooperation will be penalized to the extent that the exhibitor will be refused the opportunity to exhibit in 4-H livestock projects the following year. All areas must be clean and neat by 10:00 am.



FITTING AND SHOWMANSHIP

Showmanship implies feeding and management, the use of proper means and method of developing cattle and making them look attractive to the ringside, to prospective buyers and the official judge. Exhibitors class # is designated by 4-H'ers age as of Jan 1. Exhibitor will be judged on appearance of animal, appearance of exhibitor*, and presentation of animal in the ring. A 4-H'er who does not have their own dairy project may "borrow" an animal from another exhibitor so long as it is not a showmanship animal in a different age division.

MANDATORY FOR ALL LIVESTOCK/DAIRY PROJECTS:

4-H member must participate in showmanship and breed classes. Animal must be able to be controlled on halter, lead, and or cane,(species specific) while being exhibited.

Any animal deemed dangerous by the 4-H fair Grievance committee will not be able to participate in classes or livestock sale due e to liability. 4-H Educator will coordinate any grievance committee issues.

Grievance Committee for 2010/2011: Steven Bennett, Meg Bush, Mickey Mallory, Anita Menzi, and Dale Gridley. The grievance committee was implemented to deal with any disputes or issues that may arise in the area of livestock/dairy. All decisions made by the grievance committee will be final.

4-H ANIMAL PROJECT RECORDS

Any 4-H club member raising a 4-H Club Project Animal **MUST** enter Project Records in each of the following classes. Records will be judged on accuracy, competence, and neatness.

Special arrangements need to be made and cleared with the livestock superintendent. No nurse cows. The champion and reserve champion market steer must be sold in the livestock sale.

NOTE: Health requirements for all animals sold must be met 21 days prior to the day of slaughter.

SECTION E - DOG OBEDIENCE

4-H Superintendent - Carol Ochab

A dog obedience trial will be conducted for all youth who have attended a dog obedience training school, or who have trained their dog.

- Dog must be kept on leash at all times.
- Dogs must be vaccinated for rabies, distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis, and parvo virus.
- Proof of up-to-date shots must be received with entries.
- A bitch in season must not be shown.
- Dog leashes for on-lead exercise must be 6 ft. in length.

Project Dogs and Non-Ownership Registrations must be filed with the 4-H office by June 1.

All entry deadlines must be met - NO extensions.

Qualifying for State Fair - If the person that qualifies for states cannot go, a person that does not qualify may be chosen. The show committee will make decision.

Dress Code - as per AKC rules - “No badges, club jackets, coats with kennel names thereon or ribbon prizes shall be worn or displayed; no other visible means of identification used by an individual when exhibiting a dog in the ring.” This show will adhere to the rules and regulations set for the State Fair show pertaining to: intact clothing, limping, baiting, Danish System ribbons and advancement to the next level.



Disputes - A show committee consisting of the superintendent, the judge and 2 representatives from each club will settle any disputes. AKC rules will be used as a guideline. Please notify the 4-H Educator of any disputes.

Class No.

- 1 **Beginners A** - for youth who have not previously trained a dog. The dogs in this class must not have graduated beyond the beginner level. Dogs will be on lead and scored on the basis of 160 points.
- 2 **Beginners B** - for boys and girls who have previously trained a dog in the beginner or more advanced levels of training. Dogs must not have graduated beyond the beginner class. Dogs will be on lead and scored on the basis of 160 points.
- 3 **Graduate Beginners A** - for boys and girls who have not previously trained a dog beyond the graduate beginner level. Dogs must not have graduated beyond the graduate beginner level. Exercises and maximum possible points are the same as in the Beginners classes except the stand for examination, recall, long sit and long down are done off lead.
- 4 **Graduate Beginners B** - for boys and girls who have previously trained a dog in Graduate Beginners or more advanced levels of obedience. Dogs must not have graduated beyond the Graduate Beginner level. Exercises and maximum possible points are the same as in Graduate Beginners A.
- 5 **Novice A** - for dogs that have completed the Novice Course of instruction but have not graduated beyond this level. All of the exercises except the heel on leash and the figure 8 will be done off lead. Scored on the basis of 200 points. Dogs must not have completed their CD title (or the equivalent - UKC - C-CD, All American CD, Club CD, CKC, CD, etc.) unless the CE was earned within 60 days of the show.
- 6 **Novice B** - Exercises will be the same as Novice A. Exhibitors can participate in this class more than once. Open to any handler and dog at the Novice Level but not ready for Advanced Novice.
- 7 **Advance Novice** - for dogs that have not graduated beyond the Advance Novice level of instruction. Dogs may have earned a CD degree but not a CDX, unless the CDX was earned within 60 days of the show. Other than Heel on Leash all exercises will be performed with the dog off leash. Maximum Possible score will be 200
- 8 **Graduate Novice** - for dogs that have not graduated beyond the Graduate Novice level of instruction. Dogs may have earned a CD degree but not a CDX, unless the CDX was earned within 60 days of the show. Other than Heel on Leash all exercises will be performed with the dog off leash. Maximum possible score will be 200.
- 9 **Open A** - for dogs that have not graduated beyond the Open Class level. Dogs may have earned a CD degree but not a CDX, unless the CDX was earned within 60 days of the show. All exercises will be performed with the dog off leash. (Heel Free, Figure 8, Drop on Recall, Retrieve on Flat, Retrieve over High Jump, Broad Jump, Long Sit - 3 minutes, Long Down - 5 minutes - Handlers out of sight). Maximum possible score will be 200.

- 12 **Utility** - for dogs that have had training beyond the Open Class level. Dogs may have earned a CDX but not a UD (Utility Degree), or the equivalent, unless this title has been completed within 60 days of the show. All exercises will be performed with the dog off leash (Signal Exercise, Scent Discrimination; one metal article; one leather article; Directed Retrieve, Moving Stand and Examination, Directed Jumping).



Maximum possible score will be 200 points. Dogs may repeat this class regardless of point score or ribbon placing.

- 13 **The Brace** - for one individual with two dogs, at least one owned by the individual. The two dogs may be different breeds. Exercises will be performed as in Graduate Beginners (with 160 points maximum for the Heel on Leash and Figure 8 and 60 points each maximum for the Stand for Examination, Recall, Long Sit and Lying Down. Maximum possible score will be 400.
- 14 **The Four-Person Team** - Teams will consist of four 4-H'ers, with their four dogs simultaneously performing Graduate Beginner exercises (with 240 points maximum for the Heel on Leash, 80 points maximum for the Figure 8 and 120 points each maximum for the Stand for Examination, Recall, Long Sit and Long Down). The Figure 8 will require the use of 5 stewards as "posts". Once lined up for the Recall, the judge will instruct the 4-H'ers to leave their dogs (all four handlers leave as a group). Starting from the judge's left and working to the right, each 4-H'er will call his dog individually. Once all 4 dogs have been called, the judge will instruct the handlers to finish their dogs (as a group). Maximum possible score will be 800 points.
- 15 **Drill Team** - Each team will consist of 8 or more dogs and their trainers (4-H'ers) who will perform a detailed drill of their own design. Kids do not need to be 9 years old to compete in drill team, but they cannot have a dog. They must act as a prop. Trainers may wish to dress alike and perform to music. No adult may enter the arena with the Drill Team. Vocal or whistle commands are permitted, but they must be given by a member of the Drill Team. Dogs may be dressed to add further color. The Drill should be at least 5 minutes, but not exceeding 8 minutes in length. Points will be deducted if these limits are not met. (Loss of 1 point for each 15 seconds over or under these limits, an additional 5 points off for an over 60 second deviation). The team will be scored according to the Drill Team scorecard as follows:

- 16 **Grooming and Handling A** - for boys and girls who have never won a blue ribbon in Grooming and Handling A at the Chemung County Fair.
- 17 **Grooming and Handling B** - for boys and girls who have previously won a blue ribbon in Grooming and Handling A at the Chemung County Fair, or any handler that competes in Novice classes at AKC shows or matches. The Champion cannot compete with the same dog in future years.
- 18 **Grooming and Handling C** - for 4-H'ers who have previously been a Grooming and Handling B Champion and/or have qualified for the Open Class of Junior Showmanship at an AKC Show, matches, or the equivalent. Any 4-H'er showing a dog in this class must have completed at least the Beginners level of obedience training with this dog.

General Guidelines for Grooming and Handling Classes: The appearance of the animal (Grooming) will account for 50 points and the showing (Handling) of the animal will account for 50 points. Maximum possible score will be 100 points.



Discriminating use of bait (food, toy, etc.) will be allowed but is not mandatory. Inappropriate baiting will be severely penalized.

Gaiting Patterns - Dogs should be moved at a trot. How smoothly a pattern is performed is more important than the actual mechanics of it (i.e., which hand switched where.). 4-H'ers should strive to keep their dogs between themselves and the judge where possible. 4-H'ers in all divisions (A, B, C) will be expected to be able to gait their dog in a circle, a triangle, and in a straight line. The straight line may be on a diagonal of the ring or parallel to a side of the ring (e.g., judge may ask handler to gait his dog "straight up and back"). 4-H'ers in Grooming and Handling divisions B and C will additionally be expected to be able to gait their dogs in an L pattern and also in a straight line paired with another 4-H'er and his/her dog. 4-H'ers in Grooming and Handling C may be asked to gait their dogs in a T pattern. In any division (A, B, C) the judge may ask the 4-H'ers questions about their dogs. In the A division, basic questions such as "How old is your dog," "What breed/breeds is your dog," etc. may be asked to familiarize the 4-H'er with being asked a question and responding. In the B and C divisions, more difficult questions may be asked (e.g., parts of the dog, breed specific questions, etc.).

AGILITY

Note: Only dogs that are competing at a minimum of Graduate Beginner A in Obedience are eligible for showing in agility classes

Class No.

- 19 **Pre-Novice Agility** - A ten obstacle course that is straight forward using non-winged jumps, pipe tunnel, low A-frame, tire jump, table and dog walk. There will be two jump heights offered 8" for smaller dogs and 16" for larger dogs. Any other heights will follow NYS Fair rules.
- 20 **Novice Agility** - For all dogs who have received a blue award at the Pre-Novice level. This class shall consist of 12-13 obstacles.
- 21 **Open Agility** - For dogs that have received a blue award at the Novice level. Weave poles and additional obstacles may be added; this is at the judge's discretion.
- 22 **Agility Excellent** – For dogs who have received a blue award in the Open Level, Dogs must not have completed their AKC Excellent Title (or equivalent-NADAC, USDAA, etc.) unless the title was earned within 60 days of the show. Dogs who have titled or received a blue ribbon in this class may compete FEO (For exhibition Only)

RALLY OBEDIENCE

We will be following the AKC rules for Rally Obedience with changes made to make the course 4-H and youth compatible.

- 23 **Rally Novice A**_(novice on leash) - Any dog who has either never competed in Rally Obedience or who has not received a blue ribbon in Novice A class should enter this class.
- 24 **Rally Novice B**_(novice on leash) - Any dog that has received a blue ribbon in Rally Novice A must move up to this class.
- 25 **Rally Advanced** (advance off leash) - Any dog that has received a blue ribbon in Rally Novice B must move up to this class

- For health regulations for goats, see Dairy and Livestock Health Regulation.
- Each animal must be owned and cared for by club member since June 1. Identification/Ownership papers need to be turned into the 4-H office by June 1.
- **Horns:** Dairy goats with horns will not be permitted to show. NO EXCEPTIONS. Meat Goats with horns are allowed, but aggressive horned goats may be required to be artificially tipped or required to leave the fairgrounds at the discretion of the 4-H Educator(s).

FITTING AND SHOWMANSHIP

Fitting implies feeding and management, the use of proper means and method of developing goats and making them look attractive to the ringside, to prospective buyers and the official judge. To be judged on appearance of animal, appearance of exhibitor, presentation of animal in the ring.

SECTION G - HORSES

This year a *split horse show* will again be in effect (4-H and open). 4-H Exhibitors will have facilities from Sunday evening through Thursday am. We will be sharing the Fairgrounds with another Horse Show on Sunday when we are arriving. Please be conscientious of the riders on Sunday. If you want to stay through the weekend, you must enter your horse in open class competition. Open class premium books are available in early July. Questions concerning rules and procedure should be directed to the 4-H office well in advance of the Fair.

Pre-Entry due July 10 to the 4-H office.

Project Record Books are due with fair entry forms in order to be eligible to participate at fair.

Horses must be in place by 10:00 pm, Sunday July 31, 2011.

Philosophy: The 4-H horse program is concerned with the development of young people. The horse is used as a medium for this training. The classes are prepared with knowledge of the wide variation in economic background of 4-H members and the varied conditions under which 4-H clubs operate. Members must have turned in project horse sheet and record books to be eligible to show. Current Rabies & Coggins must be on file with the 4-H office.

Classes are open to all 4-H members officially enrolled in the horse project prior to June 1, 2010. Members may show a horse owned by someone outside the family providing they give it a reasonable amount of care. A statement by the owners may be required.

Stallions or Equines under 24 months will not be shown.

Dressage/Programmed Riding times are to be scheduled. If you miss your scheduled time you will not be allowed to make it up or reschedule. (Conflicts or emergencies see the 4-H Educator)

Classes may be split or combined depending upon the number of entries.

Unsportsmanlike behavior will result in ***dismissal from the ring.***

Ride from barn to ring at a walk only.

- A copy of a negative Coggins test for the current calendar year or previous calendar year must be on file in the 4-H office. All horses entered must have proof of rabies inoculation on file in the 4-H office within the last year.
Note: Horses from Pennsylvania must have negative Coggins for current calendar year and an interstate health certificate within the past 30 days.
- Proper attire is required in all classes. ASTM approved protective headgear shall be worn with straps buckled whenever mounted on an equine. Regardless of riders age (this means parents, trainers, and friends).
- Levels for the current year are:



Western & English:

Level 1, Cloverbud w/t, Beginner Level 2, Level 2, Level 3, 13 & under, 14 to 19.

Jumping:

Level 3 and 13 & under and 14 & over.

Gymkhana:

Level 1, Cloverbud w/t, Beginner Level 2, Level 2, Level 3 and open ages.

5. For Fair all members must attend the mandatory meeting unless there is an emergency, Dr. 's excuse, employer's note, or sickness. Notify office ahead of time!
6. For Fair the recommendation is to have horses in by 6:00 p.m. No horses will be allowed in after 10:00 p.m. on Sunday.
7. Stalls will be assigned. Check with the 4-H office.
8. The ANNOUNCER'S STAND AND INSIDE THE ENTRY BOOTH are "off limits" to any exhibitor or unauthorized person. This applies to everyone!
9. MANDATORY: All 4-H members must show Fitting & Showmanship at the Fair show.
10. For State Fair showing you can only use the Project Horse(s) designated for the current years showing. Project horse certificate must be filled out and on file in the 4-H office by June 1 of the current year.
11. To qualify for State Fair a 4-H member must show in two shows, one of which must be the fair show. If there are a limited number of State Fair entries, others may be considered.
 - Selection will be based on performance and placing at these shows.
 - Chemung County is allowed 4 riders for each section: Western, English, Gymkhana, Dressage, and Saddle seat.
 - All State Fair arrangements, entries, changes are to be made through Extension Office and representative. Contact the committee at this Fair to enter State Fair.
12. Levels 1, Cloverbud w/t, Beginner Level 2, Level 2, and Level 3 cannot show in 13 and under or the 14-19 year old classes. Level 1, and Level 3 riders can be of any age if they meet level criteria. Cloverbud w/t, Beginner Level 2, and Level 2 have age guidelines.
13. The judge's decision is final. All complaints are to be taken to the Show Committee NOT the judge. Please notify the 4-H Educator of any disputes.
14. The Fair Horse show is limited to 4-H members enrolled in Chemung County 4-H; may be opened to other counties if there is no horse show/fair in their county – this is done through the 4H office – will not take Chemung County kids places in the State Fair qualifying.
15. Poor sportsman or horsemanship on the part of the rider or misbehavior of the horse will subject entry to dismissal. Any racing or running on the fairgrounds is prohibited; no riding a horse with just a halter on (This rule will be enforced by the show committee.).
16. The Show Committee reserves the right to cancel, combine, or divide any class that entries warrant, and is not responsible for any accident, injury, or loss to any person, animal, or property while on the Chemung County Fairgrounds. There must be two entries to run a class. Saddle seat classes will be added if there are at least two riders per class. On entry sheet add the letter "S" to the class number for saddle seat entries.

SECTION N - ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

Rules: All exhibits must have been made during the current 4-H year.
One entry per class, except starred class numbers.

Class No.

1 **Plaster Casts** - 3 specimens relating to conservation -mounted on durable material and labeled.

2 **Mounted Display** - identifying at least 15 different kinds of trees or weeds found in New York State woodlots, or fields. May be made up of small selections of the tree, showing bark, cross and tangential sections of the trunk and mounted on a board.



- 3 **Display of Model** - made of clay, wood, paper, or other suitable material, to show one or more good practices in soil, forest, conservation, water, and wildlife or bird identification. Exhibit may be club or individual.
- 4 **Science Exhibit** - demonstrating some principle in the field of science such as: birds, insects, models, charts, etc. (**Models may not be pre-cut kits**)
- 5 **Insect Collections** - first year project exhibits must include a minimum of 10 specimens representing 5 insect orders.
- 6 **Insect Collections** - second year project exhibits must include a minimum of 20 specimens representing 9 insect orders. Ten (10) specimens must have been collected during the current club year.
- 7 **Insect Collections** - Forest insects - mounted display of at least 5 forest insects and diseases common to New York. Insect injuries to forest must be shown.
- 8 **Dried Pelt** - Dried Pelt (taken by legal means and prepared by exhibitor) beaver, fur, mink, opossum, etc. Two pelts may be entered in this class but they must be from two different kinds of animals.
- 9 **Bird Study** - Judged on creativity of exhibitor in presenting his bird study experience to the public.
- 10 **Fly Tying** - A display of at least three (3) different flies tied by the exhibitor, mounted and labeled. Tools constructed and used by the exhibitor may be included.
- 11 **Geology** - Display of at least 15 rocks, minerals or fossils. Labeled, identified, and printed with name, date collected, locality, and collector.
- 12 **Nature Trail Signs** - 3 different signs will make one exhibit.
- 13 **Miscellaneous** - any other item not mentioned above. Maple Syrup - 1-pint jar, made in backyard maple syrup project. Honey - 1-pint jar. Must include a 3x5 index card explaining the process you used.
- 14 **Camp Exhibit** - to consist of 3 unlike items made at 4-H camp this year.

SECTION P - FLORICULTURE, LANDSCAPING, FRUITS, VEGETABLES

Rules: Exhibits – three stems shall comprise an exhibit except where otherwise stated. Flower stems should be 8 inches long, except where flower type makes this impossible. Gladiolus stems should be at least 12 inches below first florets.

Variety of type names must be listed for all cut flowers except the collections. No un-named varieties will be awarded a blue ribbon.

All exhibits of stems must be same variety and color.

4-H will furnish containers for exhibits. Bring extra flowers, in case of damage. Containers used in arrangements shall be judged as part of exhibit. Attach label with your name to container.

GLADIOLUS – An entry is one stem of the type of the color listed.

ROSES – An entry is one stem of the type listed.

DAHLIAS – An entry is one bloom.

PLANT PATHOLOGY CLASS

- 48 **Fungus Collections** - must have a minimum of 12 distinctive kinds of fungi (mushrooms, toadstools or bracket fungi). For full credit the dried collection should contain spring, summer, and autumn specimens and be labeled in the manner described in the 4-H project material "Fun with Fungi", M-11-5.
- 49 **Plant disease collections** - must include a minimum of 15 diseased leaves, stems, or other plant parts. Each specimen should be labeled to give the name of the disease (identified as well as possible) and the date and place collected.

VEGETABLES CLASSES

Rules: All exhibits will be judged on the basis of quality. Not more than one entry may be made in any class. Vegetable exhibits are not saved after the fair. Ribbons may be taken from the exhibit after 5:00 pm Sunday or obtained at the 4-H office prior to September.



Names of varieties should show with the exhibit. No blue ribbon will be awarded to unnamed varieties in individual classes.

The amount of each vegetable to be shown will be the same as the individual class of that vegetable. Vegetables entered in this class may also be entered in classes 46 - 91. The exhibit will be judged on varieties, color, quality, and attractiveness. Each individual variety within the exhibit will contribute to the total premium.
- 95 **Junior Garden Exhibit** - Open to members growing fewer than 10 kinds of vegetables. Vegetables entered in this class may also be entered in the classes 46 - 86 but not class 91. Prizes will be awarded according to size and quality of exhibit. Premiums same as for class 90.
- 96 **Collection of twenty (20) or more specimens of Vegetable Seeds** with picture and/or leaf and description of vegetable used for identification in Vegetable Crops Contest.
Mounting of Collections - collections may be on one side of two pieces of poster board (22"x22") or like material - or - in notebook binder with 1 or 2 specimens per page (8 1/2" x 11").

SECTION QW WOODWORKING

A double tag should be filled out for each entry and tied securely to the exhibit. Exhibits must be part of 4-H project.
Class No.

- 1 Any article made in the 4-H Woodworking Project that was cut out, assembled, and finished with hand tools only. (Four entries will be allowed in this class but the entries may not be alike.)
- 2 Any article made in 4-H Woodworking Project to be used as part of another project such as Outdoor Environmental Conservation, a mounting board, garden line reel, rope halter, etc. 3 entries allowed, must not be alike.
- 3 **Wood Craft Projects** - Limit 3

SECTION QE ELECTRICITY

A double entry tag should be filled out for each entry and tied securely to the exhibit. Exhibits must be part of 4-H project.

Class No.

- 1 Any article made in a 4-H project, such as a trouble light, rewired old lamp, pin-up lamp, electrical game, splice board, any first year project.
- 2 **Facts about fuses & wires, Facts about Electrical Motors** - 4-H'ers should develop a circuit director & make a test lamp or need to construct a motor or other motor devices.
- 3 **Advanced Electric** - Become acquainted with different wiring devices and use them in completing 5 exercises that simulate actual wiring situations.
- 4 **Computer Project** - Any computer project may be entered. Programs will be judged on the quality of the computer program. Presenters are responsible to bring their own laptops for viewing by the evaluator. The entry must include a written documentation for operating the program and computer and sample of printout of screen contents.



SECTION R PHOTOGRAPHY

Limit 5 entries per class or not to exceed a total of 10 entries in Photography.

Specifications for the attached 4-H Photography exhibit classes are drawn and adapted from the 4-H Photography member's manuals:

Rules:

All exhibits must be mounted on sturdy background and should be titled.

All exhibits will be judged on technical quality, composition, story telling ability, and preparation of the exhibit.

Exhibit preparation to demonstrate good workmanship and use of materials.

No photos smaller than 3 ½" by 3 ½" not larger than 8" x 10" adjacent to each photo must be a title or caption to assist the viewer to interpret the photographic message.

Attached in some way to each exhibit, list: Class Number, Exhibitors Name, County, Age, and number of years in photography project.

SECTION S MESSAGES ABOUT FOOD RECIPE COLLECTIONS

Foods are exhibited in Sections S & T.

Rules: Basic Requirements for all collections:

Minimum of 10 recipes exhibited in a recipe box, notebook, or file. All information should be printed in ink or typed. If recipes are shown in a file box, everything should be on cards.

Recipes and holder must be the result of the current project year's work.

Exhibitors are encouraged to select recipes that reflect good nutrition. (Ex. lower sugar and fat content)

Collections will be judged on appearance, organization, source and variety of recipes. Exhibitors must have tried all of the recipes and included comments on how well they were liked and recommendations for their use.

Class No.

1 **Project recipes** - Any of the 4-H foods projects including: Snack Wisely, Food in the Morning, Fun With Fruits, Versatile Vegetables, Be a Food Detective, Target What You Eat, or Fit It All Together.

All recipes should emphasize:

- The nutritional focus of the project chosen or
- A specific food category (Ex. snacks, breakfast foods, etc.)

Chief Nutrients should be listed for each recipe. Exhibitor is encouraged to investigate and try new recipes. Recipes should be selected from a variety of sources and source must be stated. **Do not include** recipes listed in the 4-H Project Materials.

2 **Heritage Recipes** - should be collected from parents, grandparents, ancestors, or from neighbors or older community residents. These should reflect a variety of foods your family or early settlers (Early American or Ethnic Foods) brought to your particular region during a generation other than your own. Include comments about the Heritage Aspects of each food, how used, and by whom. Illustrations are welcome.

3 **Microwave** - A collection of recipes from a variety of sources, sources must be stated. Comments on how well they were liked and recommendations for their use.

4 **International** - A collection of recipes from a variety of sources, but not from the 4-H International Foods Project. Comments are not limited to but should include: a) country of origin, b) national traditions associated with the food, c) historical background, d) how it should be served.

SECTION T BAKED FOODS

Foods are exhibited in Sections S & T.

Rules: All baked foods should be thoroughly cooled before wrapping. Do not exhibit rolls or muffins in paper baking cups. No frosting or sweet toppings, put on either before or after baking, are permitted on cookies, quick



breads, or cakes. Do not brush exhibits with butter or egg wash before or after baking. Any type of toppings is permitted on international foods. Exhibit all foods on a paper plate or on foil wrapped cardboard, not in pans. Enclose all exhibits in plastic bag or wrap.

Note: To move food choices toward dietary guidelines, exhibitors are encouraged to select recipes with a lower sugar and fat content.

Exhibits requiring refrigeration are not allowed!

Prepared mixes may not be used unless it is not a predominant part of the recipe. * (Exception: Cake decorating)

Exhibit your own work.

Class No.

- 1 **Baked Foods:** Please include 3x5 card explaining the nutritional value of each food listing ingredients and nutrients provided.

Examples: Nutritious Cookies or Cakes - include recipe, why nutritious, 3 specimens
Brownies or Bars - 3 specimens
Muffins, quick breads - 1 loaf or 3 rolls
Cakes - not frosted
Yeast Breads or rolls - 1 loaf or 3 rolls
Pie - 1 or 2 crust - cooled
Candy - 4 pieces
Preserved Foods - labeled with ingredients and canning method used
Decorated cakes - on cake, form or box

SECTION U CLOTHING AND TEXTILES

Rules:

Entries must be clean and well pressed.

Entries may be entered and exhibited in a transparent dress cover.

Class No.

- 1 **Samples Notebook** - A notebook of construction techniques used in completing 4-H sewing projects. Example - Different seam finishes, different hemstitches, different types of closures, etc.
- 2 **Items made as part of Sewing Level I Project** - Three (3) entries per person may be entered in this class. (Ex. Equipped Sewing box, potholders, aprons, simple skirt, shorts, etc.)
- 3 **Items made as part of Sewing Level II Project** - Five (5) may be entered in this class. (Ex. Shirt, blouse, pants or skirt with zipper, waistband, etc., unlined jacket, jumper, dress, swimsuit, 2 piece coordinated outfit, sundress)
- 4 **Items made as part of Sewing Level III Project** - Five (5) entries per person may be entered in this class. (Ex. Tailored outfit, formal gown, lined jacket, coats, garments made of wool, uneven plaids, velvet or sheer fabric garments).
- 5 **Clothing Accessory**
- 6 **Special Interest Projects** - examples: Backpacks, Sleeping bags, Horse Blankets, etc.



- 7 **Accessorized Outfit** - outfit may be purchased but must be exhibited on mannequin, wooden cut out or modeled. Include a 3x5 card listing costs, reason for choices, fabric content, care instructions and appropriate uses.
- 8 **Textile Career Project** - examples: Scrapbook, Report, and Notebook
- 9 **Modeling** - Youth from 5-19 participate in Clothing Revue at County Fair, modeling constructed or ready made garments. Outfit and narrative printed on 3x5 card will be judged.
- 10 **Fabric Furnishing** - examples: Bedspreads, Quilts, Curtains, etc.
- 11 **Fabric Accessory** - examples: Pillows, Placemats, Needlework, Knitting, Embroidery, etc.

SECTION W HOME ENVIRONMENT

Class No.

- 1 **Furniture** - Wood, New unfinished, refinished or constructed by exhibitor.
- 2 **Wood Accessory Item** - such as stools, shelves, picture frames, etc. Not to include woodcraft projects or Environmental Conservation Projects. Kits allowed, but must be noted. 3"x5" card should be included explaining the source (new, used, kit, handmade) methods used, products used, and where item will be used.
- 3 **Interior Design** - A scaled floor plan of a completely furnished room either computer generated, on
- 4 **Scale Floor Plan** - a) A 1/2' scale floor plan and fold-up wall elevations showing a completely furnished room rendered in color and mounted on a sheet of white construction paper, b) a companion color scheme collage to the scale of fold-up room mounted on a sheet of white construction paper. Statement on 3"x5" cards: Make a brief statement as to why you arranged the furniture as indicated on the floor plan.

SECTION X CHILD DEVELOPMENT / CARE

Rules: Exhibits should illustrate the exhibitor's understanding of the growth and development of children and how specific toys, games, or activities promote growth and development at different phases of development. Emphasis is on safety and how the child will interact with the toy or game. What the exhibitor has learned about children in preparing this exhibit is of prime importance.

Class No.

- 1 **Creative Plaything** - a homemade toy, book, game, or activity to be used with children. Include age of child intended to use article, and what the child will learn from the article.
- 2 **Babysitters Kit** - including games, toys and safety materials needed while caring for a baby, toddler, or preschooler. Include explanation of planned use of articles in kit.
- 2 **Snapshot or Picture Story** - On a poster or in an album, describing a phase of a child's development- (infant, toddler, or preschooler phase)

SECTION Y CONSUMER EDUCATION

Rules: Exhibits in the following classes should reflect the members understanding of one or more consumer economics concepts, for instance: a) consumers in the marketplace b) management of resources: money, time, energy or skills.



Class No.

- 1 **Three-dimensional exhibit:** topic illustrated should be: a) convey consumer information on the topic to the fair visitor, b) employ one or more exhibit techniques: models, samples, poster series (2 or more), photos (mounted on sturdy cardboard and large enough to be seen). Signs or labels may be necessary to explain the exhibit. The exhibit should be limited to card table size. Table space will be provided. Topics which may be illustrated include, but not limited to: a collection of consumer information labels, packages and hang tags designed by the exhibitor; models or replicas of several brands or forms of a consumer product which illustrate design and other product feature differences; replicas of product testing results experienced in the “Be Aware and Compare” activity such as shampoo foaming and cleaning, pH levels, etc.; a sample/replica of a defective product and a description / illustration of ways to obtain satisfaction.

A display of models / replicas of consumer products available by mail order purchaser and an outline of consumer rights and responsibilities in mail order purchases.

SECTION Z ARTS AND CRAFTS

Rules: All exhibits are to have been completed as a creative art, craft, or heritage project.

The emphasis in 4-H arts and crafts is on the creative process. Creativity is an aspect of everyone and should appear in the individual’s arts and crafts projects. This creativity is shown by exploring and experimenting with materials, tools and skills.

Carbon copies should be avoided and creativity should be supplemented instead.

Index card must be included with each entry explaining type and list of materials used, time involved in completing your project, etc. **Lack of this card will drop your award down one place.**

Only 3 entries per class per person in Section Z.

Class No.

- 1 **Painting, Drawings, Graphics/Prints:** A personal and creative statement or interpretation about people, events, or things from past or present. Any style of expression appropriately displayed, stretched, matted, or framed and ready to hang.

Paintings: Expressive work in any of the following media: oil, watercolor, acrylics, or mixed media, i.e., watercolor and ink, acrylic and chalk, acrylic and collage, etc.

Drawings: Expressive work in any of the following media: pencil, charcoal, crayon, colored chalk or pastel, brush and ink.

Graphics/Prints: Any printing process that duplicates one or more identical images, linoleum, woodcut, stencil, silkscreen, etching, “found” objects making an inked imprint. Designs and printing tools express ideas of and made by exhibitor.

- 2 Craft objects are of individual interpretation and expression using material, process and/or skill for utility, functional or decorative purposes.

Craft projects to include:

- a. Ceramics / Pottery - (bowls, vases, mugs, etc.)
- b. Fiber / Fabric, using weaving, needle art, macramé, string art, etc. (wall hangings, pillows, puppets, etc.) (Also see Wool Section for additional entries)
- c. Leather - (bookmarks, belts, purses, jewelry, saddlebags, etc.)



- d. Metal - (jewelry, boxes, pictures, etc.)
- e. Mosaics - (table tops, plaques, etc.)
- f. Sculpture
- g. Tie Dyeing / Batik - (apparel, wall hanging, accessories, etc.)
- h. Basketry
- I. Candles

For wood projects see section QW Class 3

HERITAGE ART, CRAFTS, AND DOCUMENTATION

Rules: NO KITS!!! Emphasis in the heritage art, crafts and documentation is on personal growth and knowledge through learning about one's cultural heritage. It is based on research of traditional designs, methods, and materials as well as learning the necessary skills.

This class emphasizes authentic use of traditional design and materials and/or documentation of history, folk art or material culture.

Class No.

- 3 **Heritage Art and Crafts:** Traditional objects using materials, methods and/or decoration based on a continuation of ethnic art or handed down from one generation to another. Ex. Fur objects, soap, cordage, dolls, cured and tanned leather objects, tin ware, wooden toys and games, stenciled wood and tin ware, natural clay pottery, traditional embroidery and quilted objects, splint or natural reed basketry, ethnic art objects.
- 4 **Processed Natural Fibers:** Natural fibers processed for use. Ex. Rawhide. For hand spun wool and natural dyed yarns please see Section L (wool division - pg. 34)
- 5 **Heritage Documentation:** Documentation of family or community history, building, and methods of processing and / or use. Ex. Genealogy charts, architectural drawings and legends, collections of traditional objects and legends, herb exhibit and charts, natural dye exhibit and charts.
