



Get the Most from Your Garden and Landscape ...

Whether you're a new homeowner or an experienced gardener, you can always use some good advice.

Cornell Cooperative Extension staff and Master Gardener Volunteers offer research-based information from Cornell and other universities about how plants grow, when to prune, how to get the most from a small vegetable garden and many more gardening challenges. Our phone-in Horticulture Hotline has helped local home gardeners for decades, and we recently added a blog to help answer questions. Now we're adding another service -- a visit to your home.

How does it work?

Uniquely qualified Master Gardener Volunteers will come to your home, walk your property with you, make suggestions and answer questions about changes you want to make in your landscape and gardens. For example, we'll look at specific trees or shrubs, assess the general health of your lawn, evaluate shade/sun issues and then discuss your next steps with you.

What do you get?

You will receive a written report outlining our observations, suggesting ways you can make the changes you want on your property, and providing fact sheets and instructions on how to proceed. You can then make the changes yourself or work with a landscape professional to get the most out of your home garden.

What not to expect

The site visit is not a substitute for a professional landscape design consultation or an assessment of tree health by a certified arborist.

What is included in the site visit?

The site visit actually starts with you. We will ask you to complete a detailed questionnaire. You'll tell us about problems you've had, changes you want to make, and what your goals are for the future of your landscape and gardens. When we arrive at your home, we will have studied your answers carefully and then we'll begin our walk-through. What we will do includes:

- Detailed observations about the property
- Rough sketch of the property
- Lawn health assessment
- Overall assessment of the health of your trees and shrubs
- Examination of specific plant problems you noted on your questionnaire
- Evaluation of areas of your property that may present gardening challenges (e.g., wet, very shady, steep slopes)
- Evaluation of areas of your property where you noted changes you want to make (e.g., proper site for herb garden?).

This is a limited offer!

This site visit program is available to a limited number of households each spring and fall. Help us raise funds for more new and exciting ways to help Putnam County residents learn healthy gardening methods, have more confidence in the garden and make good use of their landscapes.

Your sustainable landscape begins here.

Our questionnaire will help you take a fresh look at your property. It's designed to gather information from your perspective, because you're the person who knows most about your landscape and how you want to use it.

- It's a good idea to walk your property at least one day before you answer the questions, making notes about what you want us to look at.
- Please answer all the questions as completely as possible.
- Make sure you fill out the section on what you want to do on your property in the future -- entertain, play ball with your children, grow vegetables, plant fruit trees, have ornamental gardens, clear out brush -- anything you can think of.
- You may include photos or diagrams.
- You may also want to make a list of your priorities and concerns prior to our visit to best be prepared.

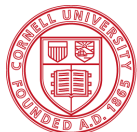

Who are the Master Gardener volunteers?

All Master Gardener Volunteers complete a 15-week training course and advanced education in specific subjects of their own choosing. They help Cornell Cooperative Extension bring scientific information about plants, insects, birds and the environment from Cornell University and other land-grant colleges to you to help you make the most of your gardens, landscaping and property. The Master Gardener Volunteers who perform the site visits have completed an advanced curriculum in site assessment, plant health, pathology evaluation, and topographical issues.

At least two Master Gardener Volunteers will perform your site visit. Then they will work under the supervision of one of our professional horticulturists to evaluate their observations and write the report.

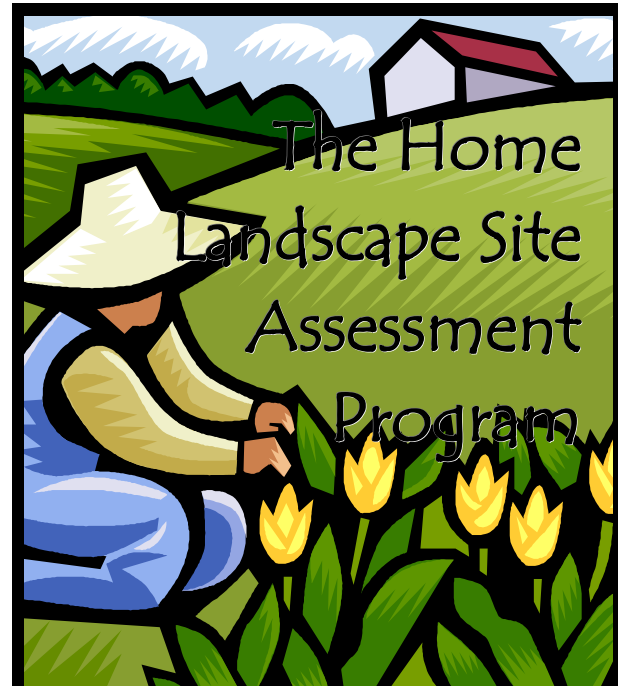

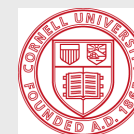
