## **URGENT... COUNTY FAIR DATES CHANGE! AUGUST 4<sup>th</sup>-10, 2008**

The Gouverneur-St. Lawrence County Fair Board has announced a change in fair dates due to an unavoidable situation with the carnival provider. Flexibility is the name of the game! Mark your calendar!

August 2	Youth Building Judging Day
August 4-10	County Fair

As a result there will be some changes in the State Fair entry process, as County Fair dates back up against some important state deadlines for animal entries (August 11<sup>th</sup>) and dormitory registration (August 15<sup>th</sup>). As a result, State Fair entry forms may be due to the 4-H office prior to or during the County Fair. 4-H staff will continue to look at all youth exhibit areas, deadline concerns and make appropriate adjustments. Information will be provided in future Cloverleaf Connections.

## **New Testing for Cattle Fair Entries**

As of the 2008 fair season, all cattle exhibited at NY county fairs or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

Currently acceptable tests for cattle **less than 61 days old;**

- ✓ Skin notch BVD virus Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE)

- ✓ Whole blood BVD virus isolation
- ✓ Whole blood BVD virus PCR

Currently acceptable tests for cattle **61 days of age and older:**

- ✓ Skin notch BVD virus Antigen Capture ELISA (AGE)
- ✓ Serum or milk BVD virus Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE)
- ✓ Whole blood BVD virus isolation
- ✓ Whole blood BVD virus PCR

4-H Teen Council is largely responsible for many of the 4-H related activities and events that happen throughout St. Lawrence County. Teen Council members exhibit excellent public speaking and leadership qualities.

Their slate of officers are Bethany Burnham, Canton, Chairman; Reggie Pierce, Heuvelton, Vice Chairman; Sarah Hunter, Gouverneur, Secretary; Ian Burnham, Canton, Treasurer; and Rachel Hunter, Gouverneur, News Reporter. This slate of officers will lead the 4-H Teen Council into the 4-H year for the up coming year. These positions are vital for the success of the Teen Council.

The 4-H Public Presentation Contest is a public speaking contest where participants are evaluated on their public speaking skills. This contest is separated into many different divisions. Members can choose to do a Demonstration, Illustrated Talk, Speech, Dramatic, or a Recitation. The choices are vast which makes the contest very interesting to watch. The first chance that 4-H members can give their presentation is at Area Day, which is going to be held on Saturday, February 2<sup>nd</sup> at the Cornell Cooperative Extension Learning Farm, Canton. This is a “practice” for the 4-H’ers and is not required in order to advance to County Day. County Day will be held on Saturday, April 5<sup>th</sup> at the Hermon DeKalb School. County Day is the first step in the evaluating contest. In order to go on to presenting at the Gouverneur & St. Lawrence County Fair, a member must be selected at County Day. The 4-H Public Presentation contest is a good chance for 4-H members to practice and perfect their public speaking skills.

Teen Winter Weekend, Croghan, is going to be held on Friday, February 15<sup>th</sup> through Sunday, February 17<sup>th</sup>. This weekend invites teens from across New York State to participate in many winter related activities that include various leadership projects for kids of all ages. Patrick Ames, 4-H Program Leader, is going to be leading an outdoor activity at the Teen Winter Weekend. Teen Council is hoping to have some representatives there from St. Lawrence County.

4-H Teen Council was also presented the idea of having 4-H members read to the children in different school districts on New York Agriculture Literacy Day, which is going to be Tuesday, April 8<sup>th</sup>. The purpose of this event is to promote awareness, understanding, and appreciation of agriculture and the food and fiber system. This year’s theme is going to be making maple syrup. The book is appropriately entitled **Sugarbush Spring**. The 4-H Teen Council thought that this was a great endeavor and is going to give it as much support as they can.

4-H Teen Council is excited about the prospects for the upcoming year. The next business meeting will be held on Wednesday, February 13<sup>th</sup> at the Cornell Cooperative Extension Learning Farm, Canton.

## Pheasants

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is once again distributing day-old chicks for rearing and releasing to qualified 4-H'ers. Those interested in the project should first become familiar with the department's "Pheasant Rearing Guide" and video "How to Raise Ring Neck Pheasants". For those interested in the project, there are many responsibilities that you should plan on. Project leaders review project requirements, discuss rearing techniques, and explain project expectations. Leaders inspect rearing facilities and evaluate the release site before approving 4-H youth to ensure proper rearing and release conditions for the birds. Youth and project leaders usually monitor progress together and share their experiences with other participants at 4-H meetings. The number of pheasants released is recorded at the end of the project.

We are maintaining a database of people who receive birds from the Reynolds Game Farm in case a voluntary Avian flu-testing program is initiated. A form will be provided, at the time of delivery, to be completed listing the information needed: such as name, address, phone number and number of chicks received by each participant.

The rearing and release of pheasants requires a great deal of responsibility by 4-H youth and a substantial time commitment. Reasons to raise pheasants: rearing pheasants is enjoyable, challenging and teaches youth responsible behavior, released pheasants offer fall hunting opportunity and people enjoy seeing and hearing pheasants.

All pheasants are hatched and delivered from the DEC Reynolds Game Farm in Ithaca New York. The deadline to order pheasant chicks is March 13<sup>th</sup>. ## 4-H Fund Raising Plan 2008

### Club Help Sought

Recently 4-H has been asked to develop a new approach to its annual fundraising strategy. The request has primarily come from 4-H clubs, volunteers and 4-H'ers who are weary of 4-H cookie sales and chicken BBQs. So, the 4-H Youth Advisory Committee and 4-H Teen Council collaborated to establish a fund raising plan for 2008. We will need your help to pull it off!

The plan is multifaceted and spans the course of the entire year. Activities include the following:

- Annual fund drive targeting St. Lawrence County 4-H alumni
- Trip and award fund drive targeting local civic organization
- Free countywide car wash in the spring
- 4-H activity booth at the Dairy Princess Parade selling 4-H cows.
- Fundraising sales in the 4-H Youth Building at the fair
- Donation clovers (similar to March of Dimes) in the 4-H Youth Building at the county fair
- 4-H dinner and auction in conjunction with Harvest Festival in September

The first big event that we need support for from our local clubs is the free car wash. You may be wondering, "How do you raise money with a FREE car wash?" It is simple; each participating 4-H'er solicits pledges for each car washed by the ENTIRE group. If a person pledges 10 cents a car, and we wash 100 cars then the donor owes \$10. If we wash 200 cars, then he owes us \$20. Pretty straight forward and likely a great event for a nice warm spring day. The 4-H office will be developing specific guidelines and pledge sheets that will be forwarded to club leaders. Ideally we would have carwashes taking place simultaneously at multiple locations across the county.

The second event to plan for is the Dairy Princess Parade in Canton on June 7<sup>th</sup>. Extension will be entering a float in that parade and we would like as many 4-H'ers to join us as possible. Clubs can consider entering a float of their own if desired... the more the better. The event ends in the village park where the 4-H Teen Council hopes to hold an informational booth (maybe an animal exhibit) and sell 4-H stuffed animals. The little critters seemed popular at the fair.

Please call Patrick (315-379-9192) with interest or feedback about these two events. Fund raising is critical to the success of this program. All profits directly support supplies, teaching materials and training needed to deliver the 4-H program. Lets have fun doing this together!

## Club Leader Updates

### Charters, EINs and the IRS

There has been a good response from clubs regarding the request for club charters and applying for a Federal Employee Identification Number (EIN). Quite frankly the process has been very simple, but many of us are still wondering why the request?

***Chartering your club*** - The Club Charter identifies a group as an organized 4-H club that is authorized to use the 4-H name and emblem for educational purposes. The Charter stays with the club as long as it is in existence. All chartered clubs are expected to operate within the framework of the 4-H program. The charter does not have to be renewed when leaders change or minor revisions are made in the club structure. Charter application requirements can be found on page 1 of the 4-H Club Secretary's Handbook and the application itself is on page 2 of that book.

***Employee Identification Numbers (EIN)***- All Clubs who have bank accounts and raise money are required to apply for an EIN from the IRS. The local 4-H office can provide the application (Form SS-4) and assist you by faxing it to the IRS (this seems to yield the quickest results). DO NOT USE PERSONAL SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS instead of an EIN to open a club bank account. The EIN is a nine-digit number assigned to ORGANIZATIONS for tax filing and reporting purposes.

***Does this mean clubs have to file a tax return now?***- Well, yes... but it is for information purposes only and the IRS is making it easy for small organizations like 4-H Clubs. Small tax-exempt organizations with gross receipts LESS than \$25,000 will file an electronic post-card size Form 990N. This is currently being developed and you will be notified when it is ready for use. It will only be available electronically, so if you need office support to complete this requirement please let us know.

***Should our club apply for 501(c)3 status?***- NO. Some of the club leaders have received a letter from the IRS suggesting that they complete a Form 1023 or 1024 if their club wishes to receive a ruling or determination letter recognizing them as a tax exempt 501(c)3 organization. Small organizations like 4-H Clubs are NOT set up to meet the requirements of a 501(c)3 organization and should NOT worry about doing this.

***Does the EIN mean we are exempt from sales tax?***- No. Clubs are not exempt from NYS Sales Tax. Unfortunately, the 4-H office is not allowed to give clubs our tax exemption form for the purchase of supplies or resale items. However, for large purchases a club can consider the option of avoiding sales tax by purchasing items through the 4-H office. Contact the 4-H Program Leader to discuss this option if the need arises.

Hope this helps old and new clubs alike. The 4-H Program will continue to send information your way as it develops, especially regarding the IRS Form 990N. Good luck this season!

## **Equine Identification Program – New Info**

Once again Dr. Lyda Denny from Ag and Markets will be coming to the North Country on Saturday, March 1<sup>st</sup> to share information regarding the equine identification program and to answer questions on the New York State Horse Health Assurance Program. She brings with her great information on barn management with health related practices and the equine identification card program that will be introduced soon in New York State. This card will take the place of the Coggins, rabies certificates and will identify the horse.

The Division of Animal Industry of the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets is now offering laminated cards, containing digital pictures of the equine, as a voluntary alternative to the current paper EIA test document. The two-sided laminated card is available to all equine owners in New York. The front of the card will have the equine's name, age, sex, breed, color, microchip number, tattoo, USEF ID number, and USDF ID number. There are three small color photos to verify the identity. Also included are rabies vaccination date and rabies vaccine product.

The back of the card will have the equine owner's name, address, email contact, phone number, premises ID number, USEF ID number, USDF ID number, EIA test date, test result, testing laboratory name, laboratory accession number.

The Equine EIA Test/Rabies Vaccination Card will be accepted as proof of a negative EIA test and current rabies vaccination status within the state of New York.

## 4-H/SUNY Vet Science Class

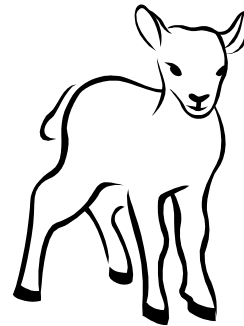

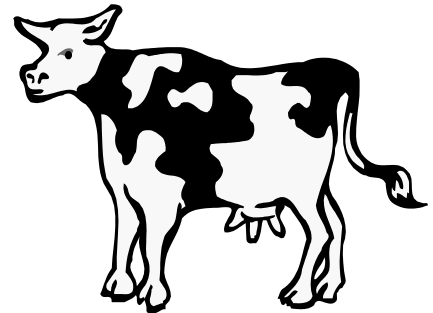
## New York Youth Dairy Discovery Workshop

This year's New York Youth Dairy Discovery Workshop will be held at Cornell, March 28<sup>th</sup> - 29<sup>th</sup>. Participation is limited to the first 60 individuals to enroll on or before the March 18<sup>th</sup> deadline, whichever ever comes first. Youth must be 15-19 years of age as of January 1, 2008. The registration fee, \$45.00 per person, includes the cost of the program activities, materials, dinner and lunch. Registration forms need to be signed by a Cooperative Extension Educator or Club Leader. Name(s) of adult chaperone(s) must accompany the registration form. Twenty-five rooms have been blocked at the Clarion for the night of March 28<sup>th</sup>. The rate of the rooms is \$85.95 per room. The block of rooms will be held until March 1<sup>st</sup> so make your reservations before this date.

## Winter Meetings at the Extension Learning Farm

**Meat Cutting** by Cliff Cook. Saturday, February 16<sup>th</sup> there will be a meat cutting demonstration by Cliff Cook. Cliff has raised sheep and other livestock and also worked as a meat cutter. We will cut up a lamb carcass and talk about the different types of cuts – what’s a chop, what’s a steak, etc - and percentages of desirable cuts. Cliff will also cover what equipment you should have if you are cutting up carcasses for your own use. Join us at the Extension Farm at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday February 16th. The program is free but please register so we know how many to plan for.

March is the time for beginners. A **Beginning Shepherd Class** will be offered all day Saturday, March 15<sup>th</sup> starting at 9:30 a.m. at the Extension Learning Farm. We will cover as much as we can including management, marketing, feeding, health, housing and fencing. If you are interested in meat goats there will be a lot of things that apply to your operation as well. There will be a hands-on component since we should be lambing at that time.
